Course Scope, Mission and Learning Outcomes

RSM 336H1 explores the theoretical framework and real-world practice of investments and portfolio management. The course is intended for students who want to become investment professionals, knowledgeable individual investors, or both. The course will cover a wide range of topics such as risk and return trade-off, asset pricing models, mutual funds, hedge funds, investment strategies, market efficiency, investor behavior, factor investing, performance evaluation, fundamental and technical analysis of stocks, term structure of interest rates and bond portfolio management. Wherever appropriate, this course will provide a global perspective to investing and incorporate the latest research in Behavioral Finance to help students understand influences of psychological biases in investment. Students will have an opportunity to put course concepts into practice by managing a live portfolio using Rotman Portfolio Manager (RPM) and resources available in the Rotman BMO Financial Group Finance Research and Trading Lab.

Learning outcomes:

- •Understand risk and return profiles of major investments and sources of their risk premiums
- •Understand bad times and risk-return trade-off in investment choices
- •Understand investment behavior of various classes of market participants

- •Understand price efficiency in the financial market and behavioral biases of investors
- Master various portfolio optimization techniques
- •Ability to construct advanced portfolio strategies including options
- Ability to evaluate money managers

Course Format and Expectations

Homework (Individual)

Homework sets and solutions will be posted on the Quercus https://q.utoronto.ca. Each student is required to turn in homework individually and upload via Quercus for grading. Doing homework problems is an important step in preparing for the tests.

Video Assignment (Individual)

This Assignment is intended to help you develop your communication skills. You will be required to create a 5-minute video in which discussing your investment philosophy, strategies and plans. You will be evaluated by your ability to analyze financial topics and to communicate your ideas orally. Increasingly, the ability to communicate well by video is a key professional skill. This individual video project uses Communicado, an online platform developed by Rotman https://rotmancommerce.communicado.ca/#/ Details about the video assignment will be posted on the course website.

Group Investment Project using RPM

The goal of this project is for students to get hands-on experience in applying concepts learned in this course to the management of a portfolio. Students will use the resources of the Rotman Finance Lab, as well as other sources of information, to research, explore and implement investment strategies, and report on their findings. The project is quite flexible, leaving room for creative groups to excel. Your portfolio performance does not affect your grade.

There are two parts to your written project report, one is quantitative, and the other is qualitative. In your written report, you should aim for clarity, strong organization, concision, professionalism, and correct grammar. Further information about the project will be provided in class and posted on the portal.

The project is done in groups. The maximum number allowed for any group is four students and the minimum number is two. Learning to work together in teams is a crucial transferrable skill you will use not only in your coursework, but also in your future careers. Support is available if you encounter common teamwork challenges such as:

- Team members feeling left out of the team.
- Team members not responding in a timely manner to communication.
- Division or quality of work among team members being unequal or unfair.
