Course Scope, Mission and Learning Outcomes

This course covers the analysis of derivative instruments such as forwards, futures, swaps, and options. By the end of the course students will have a good knowledge of how these contracts work, how they are used, and how they are priced. Lectures, assignments, and examinations will test your qualitative and quantitative understanding of the course content.

Course Format and Expectations

Lectures will be used to talk about derivatives basics and some issues surrounding them. Issues will be a combination of theoretical technical phenomena as well as concerns that must be addressed by practitioners. The text and assigned readings will be crucial in reviewing material

form lecture. Assignments (both graded and ungraded) will aid in your understanding of the material as well as provide ample opportunity for you to prepare for examinations. Guest speakers will also provide you the opportunity to better understand how you can get involved in capital markets and how this course can play a factor in your future. Guest speakers (and class time in general) will also provide an opportunity for professional network growth.

Evaluation and Grades – Graded Problem Sets Details

Four graded problem sets will require submission on the dates above (see page 1) and will be graded out of either four, or six [two points per lecture covered]. Marks will be awarded for attempting to answer the questions [displaying at least a partial understanding] and not simply just for getting the actual answer correct. If you submit all four problem sets and receive a passing grade on each you will receive 2 bonus points within the problem set portion [still a maximum of 20%]. Graded Problem Sets one through four are due by 5:00pm on the due date; late submissions will not be accepted. Except for unusual circumstances, grades on homework assignments are final and re-grading requests will not be accepted. Medical notes for late submissions will also not be accepted. The reason for this is that the solutions are posted soon after the due dates to help prepare you for the midterm and final exams. Though you are permitted to work with your peers on the graded problem sets, you must submit your own work.

Evaluation and Grades – Written Assignments Details

There will be one written assignment with a possible group discussion worth 20% each. Students will work in teams to perform research and discuss their conclusions with Harry. Teams will be formed after the course drop date. The written portion of the assignment should not be longer than two pages excluding any appendices, graphs, charts, and works cited. More details will be posted on the course webpage after the midterm.

Evaluation and Grades – Midterm Examination Details

There will be one midterm examination held on Wednesday June 1st counting for 30% of your final grade. The midterm examination will cover all topics discussed in lectures 01, 02, 03, 04, and 05, as well as the corresponding readings and problem sets. More details will be posted on the course webpage as the midterm date nears.

Evaluation and Grades – Final Examination Details

There will be a final examination held between June 22nd and June 29th [inclusive] counting for 30% of your final grade. The final exam will cover lectures 06, 07, 08, 09, 10, and 11, including all corresponding readings and problem sets. More details will be posted on the course webpage as the midterm date nears.

Evaluation and Grades – Marginal Adjustments

There will be no opportunities for extra credit. However, submission of quality problem sets and strong participation/attendance will have a weighting on borderline cases.

Writing Assignments or Presentations

The group paper is intended to help you develop your communication skills. How well you communicate your ideas, in writing or orally, will be considered in the evaluation of the assignment. In your written assignments, you should aim for clarity, strong organization, concision, professionalism, and correct grammar. Your presentations should reflect strong planning and organization, clarity of speech, and an engaging demeanour. Sources, whether in written or presentation assignments, should always be correctly attributed.

Support is available through the RC Centre for Professional Skills (CPS) for students who would like help or feedback on their writing or speaking (presentations). CPS offers both individual and group appointments with trained writing instructors and presentation coaches who are familiar

with the RC program and common types of business assignments. You can also access your college Writing Centres for help with written assignments.

Team or Group Assignments

The group paper requires students to work in teams. Learning to work together in teams is a crucial transferrable skill you will use not only in your coursework, but also in your future careers. Support is available if you encounter common teamwork challenges such as:

- Division or quality of work among team members being unequal or unfair.

Students that miss the scheduled midterm will have to write a makeup exam to be scheduled as soon as the student able. Note that this will likely be after the course drop date deadline.

As stated on page two late problem sets and group assignments will not be accepted except for extraordinary circumstances. This is to allow for quick returning of assignments to students who complete the work on time.

Students who know ahead of time that they will be unable to submit an assignment by its deadline due to reasons beyond their control should speak to the instructor about possible extension.
