Course Description

Addressing the risk of major failures is a critical challenge for organizations. From environmental disasters to pandemics to costly technological glitches and corporate fraud to social media meltdowns, numerous events in recent years have exposed the vulnerabilities of firms to catastrophic failure. Rooted in complex human, organizational, and systemic factors, such failures have the potential to severely disrupt and even bankrupt firms. Thus, business continuity planning and the protection of critical company assets from such failures are now seen as a vital part of any enterprise. This course seeks to train students to recognize the inherent vulnerabilities of business organizations to catastrophic failure, to understand why the risk of such failure represents both a profound challenge and a potential opportunity, and to become more effective decision-makers in general. To do so, we examine biases in human cognition that prevent managers from thinking effectively about the risk of catastrophic failure; consider why even small errors can have devastating consequences in complex systems; and examine how organizational barriers to learning and communication can set firms up for catastrophic failure. Throughout the course, we will consider opportunities for managers and consultants to manage these challenges.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Recognize organizational vulnerabilities to unexpected failures
- Identify specific leadership actions that prevent failure and build resilient organizations
- Act as more thoughtful and effective decision-makers.

Course Format and Expectations

Writing Assignments

Details of the written assignments will be posted on Quercus during the first week of the course. These are all individual assignments. While you may discuss the assignments with other students, your written reports should reflect your own experiences, ideas, and analysis. In your written work, it will be important to explain how you reached your conclusions and provide specific examples, observations, and evidence to support your analysis.

The purpose of the *Field Analysis* is to help you improve your ability to gather insights into risks and vulnerabilities through field observations. Drawing on course concepts and frameworks, you will collect original data through short interviews or artifacts and observations and use this evidence to identify potential weaknesses that could contribute to a future meltdown (broadly defined). The deliverable is a report that explains and integrates your findings, grounded in the real voices and practices of the group you studied.

In the *Consulting Case* assignment, you will step into the role of a consultant brought in to analyze an organization facing hidden risks. Working with a packet of raw, unstructured, and sometimes contradictory materials, your task will be to sift through the materials, separate signal from noise, and identify the organization's key vulnerabilities to future meltdowns. You will map vulnerabilities and consider how small issues could interact to cause a major failure, develop specific recommendations for reducing these risks, and reflect on the challenges of making sense of messy, incomplete evidence.

Together, these assignments are intended to help you develop your written communication skills. You should aim for clarity, strong organization, concision, and correct grammar. Sources should always be correctly attributed.

Support is available through the RC Centre for Professional Skills (CPS) for students who would like help or feedback on their writing or speaking (presentations). CPS offers both individual and group appointments with trained writing instructors and presentation coaches who are familiar with the RC program and common types of business assignments. You can also access your college Writing Centres for help with written assignments.

Class Participation

Students are expected to prepare thoroughly and make every effort to attend every class. As class participation is a graded component of the course, students will be evaluated on the following:

- Understanding and analysis of topic
- Idea generation
- Promoting further discussion

The documentation should include what tool(s) were used, how they were used (e.g., what were some prompts that you found most useful), and how the results from the AI were incorporated into the submitted work. I request this documentation solely for the purpose of improving my understanding of student engagement with these technologies. Revealing that you used generative AI will not affect your grade, but explaining how you used it will help me immensely as a teacher in future years.
